# Fire Department Strategic Plan – Stable Funding Source

- Stable Funding Source needed to:
- Meet fire and medical emergency response standards, replace vehicles and equipment, Emergency Preparedness/CERT, fire inspection program, volunteer training and retention, fund fulltime additional first responders, develop and implement peak season plan to meet increased emergency response.
- Operating Levy? Voters Decide
- Operational Consolidation? May not be in our best interest (property values concentrated Rockaway) /Difficult to coordinate

- Dedicated City funding available now Project and Equipment Reserve Fund
- Tillamook County/State of Oregon grants also available
- Approved Project Priority List
- Directive from City Council on specific Project
- Planning Commission then City Council
- Currently project: Wayside Riprap and Beach Access

# Examine impacts the of Short-Term Rental Industry in Rockaway Beach

- Tourism industry is vital to local economy/local businesses
- STR revenue provides vital funding for City services and facilities
- Increases home values Good for sellers / Bad for buyers
- Increases rental costs Good for owners / Bad for renters
- Nuisance Issues Parking, Trash, Noise
- Support Positives / Reduce Negatives

#### Sewer Rates and SDC Rates

- Sewer Rates and System Development Charges set back in 2009
- SDC one time "Buy in" fee paid by new development. Is our current rate adequate?
- Sewer Usage Rates: Sewer operating near "break even"
   point. Small adjustment now will avoid large increase later.

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
