Fire Depart:



EMT class is complete, Rockaway Beach hosted an EMT

class in cooperation with Tillamook Bay Community College. 20 Students representing all 7 Fire Departments of Tillamook County completed the class. Students are currently in the process of completing National Testing to become EMT's.

Training continues to be a priority of the Fire Department. This summer the crews are focusing on structure fire suppression techniques, water rescues, EMS, Extrication, and Wildland Firefighting.

The Fire Department is still recruiting volunteers. If you would like a challenge and make a positive impact in your community, please

come down to the fire hall and visit Chief Hesse. We do more



than fight fires. The Department responds to Rescues, Motor Vehicle Accidents, Emergency Medical Calls, Fire Alarms, Public assists, and Wildland fires. We also perform Public Education, and special events


such as the Annual Easter Egg Hunt, 4th of July Activities, Trunk or Treat, Open House, and Santa at the Station. We have something for everyone.

Burn ban- Tillamook County will be entering into a County-wide Burn Ban beginning July 15th, 2023. Burn Barrels and open pile burning is not allowed after July 15th. Fire pits will still be allowed with a valid permit. If you do not have a Fire pit permit and would like one, please go to the city website or stop by city hall and pick up a blank copy, fill out the form and submit it to the fire department for a site inspection and approval. If you have any questions, please contact Chief Hesse at thesse@corb.us.

Preparedness:

The Preparedness group is working hard with training this summer. Classes in water purification, Pet First Aid, Foraging and Local Wild Edibles, and Incident Command are on the agenda. The group will also

be participating in community events to provide education in the event of natural or man-made disaster. Subjects include floods, power outages, fires, earthquakes,



Public Works:

In the past few months, the Public Works department has been actively engaged in various projects to maintain and improve the city's infrastructure. Here is a summary of the recent activities:

1. Oregon Coast Scenic Railway (OCSR) Project: In the second week of April, OCSR worked on N 1st St. by removing old railroad ties and installing new ones. Public Works provided support

by loaning our excavator to OCSR to assist in completing the job.

2. Road
Improvement by Bayview Asphalt:

Two weeks later,



Rockaway Beach hired Bayview Asphalt to tie the existing asphalt on the road to the new railroad crossing installed by OCSR. The finished work was commendable, and the city was pleased with the outcome. 3. Pressure-Reducing-Valve (PRV) Installation: Public Works purchased a PRV, which was installed at South 2nd Ave & Grayling. This installation aimed to enhance the water system's resilience and regulate pressure to prevent over-pressurization of water lines, reducing the risk of breaks. Advanced Excavation partnered with Public Works to perform the primary installation, and the road was restored to its original condition.

4. Booster Station on Scenic View Drive: Public Works has a plan to install a new booster station on Scenic View Drive. This station will increase water pressure for residents

living uphill and accommodate the development of new homes in the area.

- **5.** Playground Upgrades: In the second week of May, Public Works laid down new wood chips in the playground area at the wayside. Any remaining wood chips were taken to Phyllis-Baker Park for use in the playground area. A generous donation from Peter and his family facilitated the purchase of these new engineered wood chips.
- 6. Maintenance and Mowing: With the arrival of better weather, Public Works took advantage of the opportunity to address the maintenance needs of the city. Mowing became a priority after a long and wet spring season.

7. Consumer Confidence Report:



Public Works informs water customers that the Consumer Confidence

Report for the year 2022 is now available on the city's website. This report, required by the Safe Water Drinking Act (SWDA), includes water sampling information from the past year, as well as EPAregulated information about the quality of the water.

These efforts demonstrate Public Works' dedication to ensuring the smooth operation and development of the city's infrastructure and utilities.

The City of Rockaway Beach was awarded funding for the design of a cycling and pedestrian path from Washington Street to Neah-Kah-Nie High and Middle Schools. The design phase is expected to begin late 2024. Construction could begin as soon as 2025.

The path is intended to create connectivity within Rockaway Beach, reduce vehicle congestion, and provide a safe route to Neah-Kah-Nie schools.
