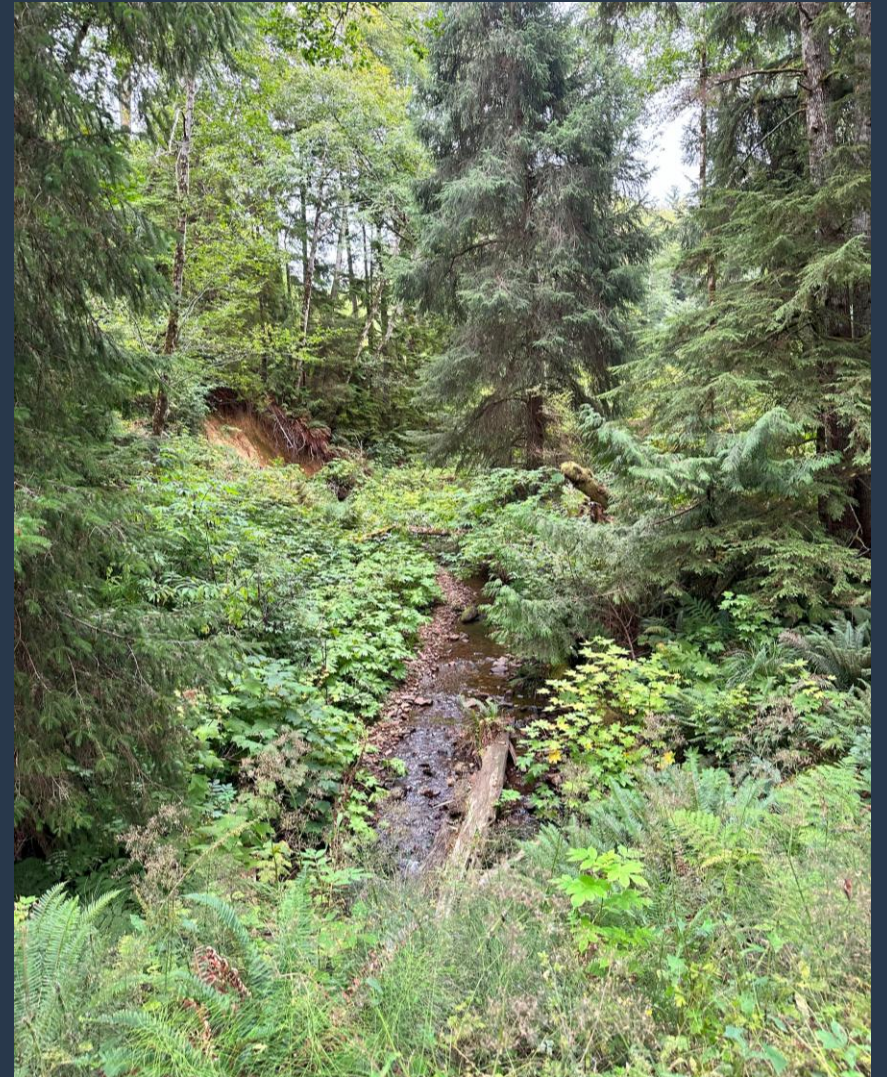

Property & Project Overview

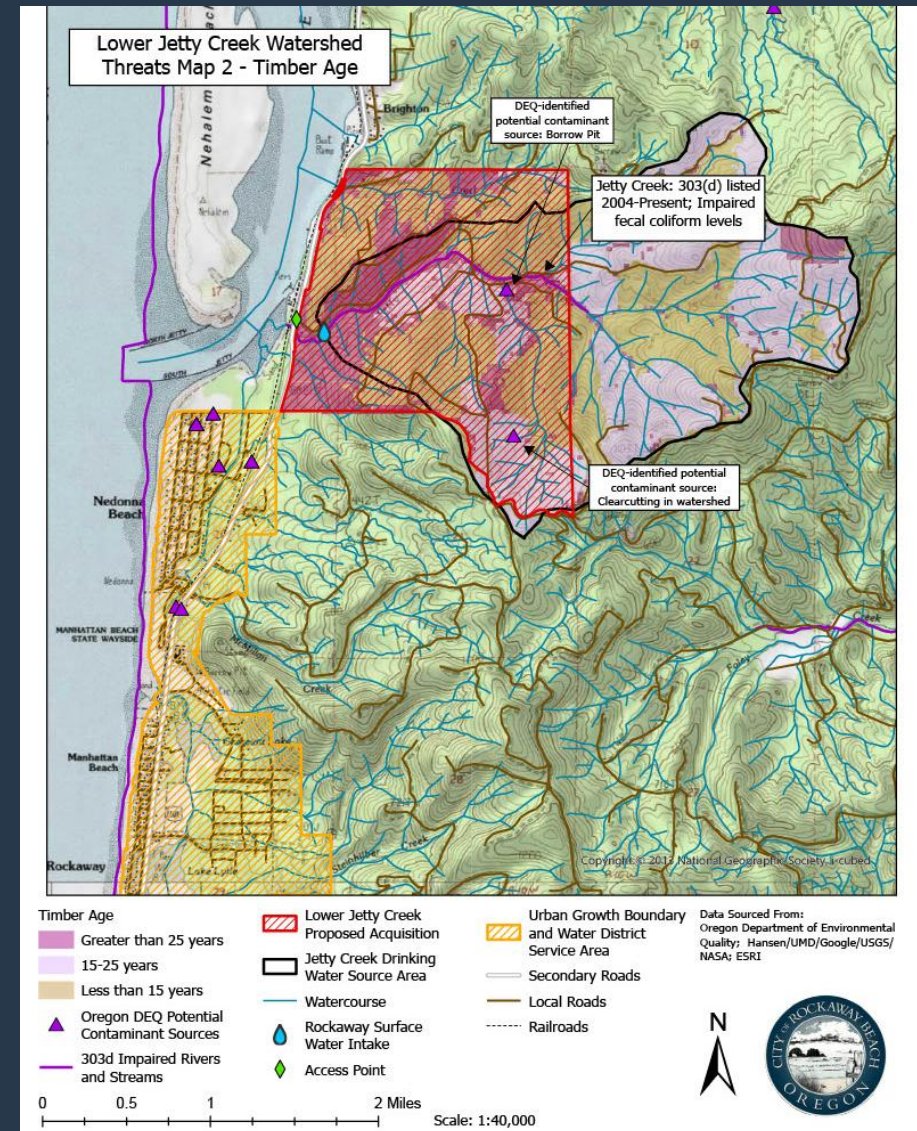
800-acre property – 595-acres in Watershed.

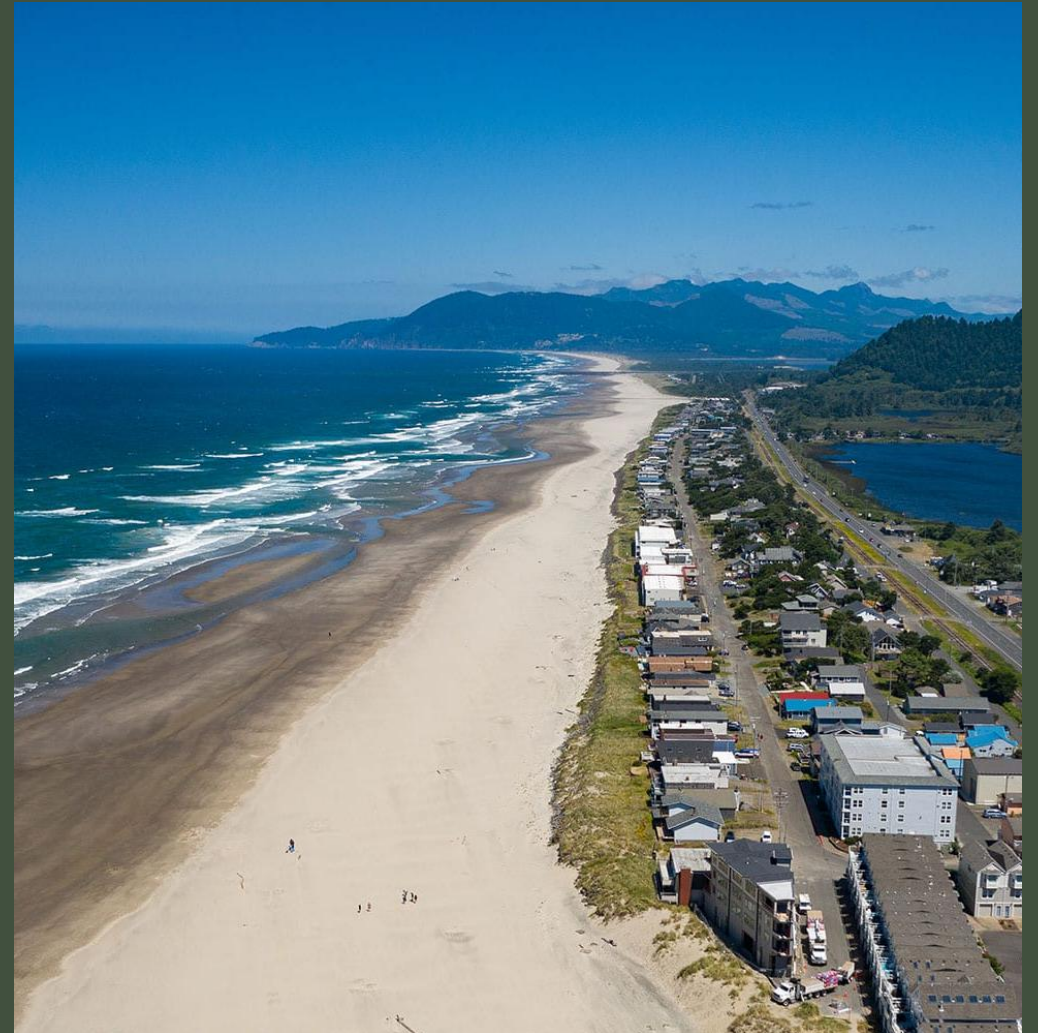
Vision:
